UNIQUE COLLABORATION GIVES RISE TO HOPE VILLAGE HOUSING

Collaboration has been key to CHAT's latest project, a tiny house village in the Chapman neighborhood that now houses six residents, each in their own home.

Hope Village, which opened in June, is made possible by well-known local construction company Slater & Son, five churches (Grace Community Church, Life Church, Firm Family Church, Neighborhood Church, Bidwell Presbyterian Church), and six non-profits/organizations (Catalyst Domestic Violence Services, The Jesus Center, Nation's Finest, True North Housing Alliance, Genesis Pallet Shelter, and the Veteran's Administration), in addition to CHAT.

Additional generous assistance has been provided by long-time local business Square Deal Mattress Factory, which donated approximately \$8,000-worth of beds and box springs.

At Hope Village's grand opening on June 8, CHAT Executive Director Nicole Drummond said, "This is a perfect example of what Chico can accomplish when we collaborate and work together in partnership."

The village was built by Slater & Son, a familyowned general contracting company founded in 1948. It was the brainchild of Brandon Slater, who had become increasingly concerned about what he describes as "an exponentially growing gap between subsidized housing and market rate housing caused by near-zero vacancies and low housing supply."

Slater adds, "The partnerships that we have created through this project is my favorite part of Hope Village."

COLLABORATION ACCOMPLISHES HOUSING SOLUTIONS

I am so inspired by how our community has come together to support those most vulnerable. From the unseen small acts of kindness to the amazing partnerships between private business, individual donors, faith-based organizations, nonprofit organizations, and government agencies. It brings me hope to see how solutions are possible when every one partners and collaborates.

CHAT is all about collaboration and creating solutions. Our guiding value is that housing is a human right. When people have their basic needs met all things are possible. We have invested deeply in all our community partnerships to support as many solutions as possible to move individuals inside and support their ability to stabilize and be the best version of themselves.

In this newsletter you will read about updates for Everhart Village, which is an emergency shelter project partnership between Butte County Behavioral Health & CHAT. This innovative project has been funded by private donations, business partnerships, and thousands of hours of volunteer labor. The site is beautiful, and CHAT is very excited to move our most vulnerable community members – people with mental illness living on the street – inside very soon.

Our two six-bedroom houses that were purchased through a state grant are currently being renovated and will soon be home to 12 unhoused individuals on Social Security. We have recently purchased three condominiums that are housing families. CHAT is also in the process of purchasing a manufactured home that will be placed on a large lot CHAT owns. The lot is zoned for the home and it will house a family or three more individuals.

We can only do this work in collaboration with our community partners. Working to connect all our resources, private and public, we really can move toward the vision of everyone having a home they can truly afford. CHAT MOVES INTO NEW OFFICE

At the end of May, CHAT moved into a new office space. According to Office Manager Amanda Starkey, this move has already made a world of difference to CHAT's work, starting with when visitors walk through the front door.

"We now have space for a nice front entry area where I can welcome guests to our office. I also love that I have been able to use our lobby to provide something fun for visitors to enjoy," she says.

As for the rest of the office building, Amanda adds, "In our previous office, we were bursting at the seams. There's something about having enough space to really be able to think, work with each other, and be creative. CHAT is, to its very core, creative."

CHAT has already taken advantage of a large community room in the center of the building, attached to a full kitchen. Amanda notes that the entire staff can fit in this space, something that was not possible previously.

In just over two months, the community room has been used for a family fun day for residents, a volunteer appreciation event, resident trainings, a Board of Directors strategic planning session, and numerous meetings. A separate conference room provides additional flexibility in scheduling meetings, as well as interviews of potential CHAT residents.

The building, at 125 Mission Ranch Boulevard, previously served as the offices of the local Mechoopda Tribe. When the Mechoopda moved their headquarters to Miriam Park, they rented the building to CHAT.

More Volunteers Sought for Final Steps SLEEPING CABINS, COMMUNITY BUILDING MOVED TO EVERHART VILLAGE SITE

The month of July saw rapid progress – and increasing excitement – for CHAT's Everhart Village project.

We officially have all 20 sleeping cabins moved on site! The 72-foot community building has been placed - that building includes showers, laundry facilities, and more. A storage shed is also at the site. The only structure that has not been placed yet is our security trailer, which will happen very soon.

Everhart Village is a collaboration between CHAT and Butte County Behavioral Health. It will be home to currently unhoused people with mental illness. A Behavioral Health street outreach team will identify candidates for this program. Behavioral Health will provide treatment to village residents, while CHAT will maintain the village, provide security, and create various community activities and social services support.

The interiors of the cabins are quickly moving along, as we have numerous individuals and groups who have offered their support to help us finish this long awaited project. On July 22, we hosted a Volunteer Kick-Off event at the site, where we were able to gather new and familiar volunteers, show our appreciation, get them oriented to the projects that need to be done, and give them a tour of the village. We had a great turn out and as always are so grateful for the ongoing support from the community. Businesses and organizations supporting this "Everhart Build" effort include the Sunrise and Noon Rotary clubs, Sierra Nevada Brewery, and the Chico Builders Association.

Some cabins are already completed, or close to complete, thanks to the generosity of Santos Construction, which allowed us to place the first cabins in their

(Continued from page 4) construction yard while infrastructure construction took place at the Everhart site, and the efforts of many volunteers.

But more work, now at the village site, needs to be done on the more recentlydelivered cabins. Work includes installing electricity and toilets, adding insulation, hanging drywall, painting, and more. All cabins will have heat and air conditioning.

Slater & Son owns the property, while CHAT holds the master lease and provides property management, and support services, including food and case management. Residents have been selected from the six partnering local non-profits and agencies, housing one resident referred by each organization. Residents will receive financial and social support from the local churches. Slater & Son is generously leasing these units to CHAT at a rate that allows them to be affordable for people with very low incomes.

Each house is essentially a self-contained studio apartment, which includes a kitchen area, washer/dryer, and bathroom.

CHAT's furniture warehouse team, organized by volunteers Vic and Pat Estrada, worked hard to fully furnish each unit, turning the houses into comfortable homes and making it possible for residents to move in by the end of June.

When she is not busy volunteering to support crosscultural arenas and disfranchised people, Linda likes to spend time outdoors. She is an avid biker, hiker, camper, and pickleball player.

Linda is in the education field, working with middle school youth on social and emotional behaviors. She has four years of experience working with at-risk youth, with many successfully graduating from high school into vocational programs and into secure housing.

FAMILIES ACHIEVE PERMANENT HOUSING

CHAT's HUSH (Hand-Up Supportive Housing) program to assist unhoused families is still going strong after four years. Sharice Atkins serves as the case manager for several families. Sharice has continued to guide families from homelessness to CHAT housing to permanent housing.

Sharice – and before her, case manager Amanda Gaylord – has seen a number of success stories over time. "Success" means getting families off the streets and out of shelters, and then bringing them into CHAT and surrounding them with supportive services. Finally, families have successfully moved from CHAT housing into permanent housing.

One such success story is Jasmine. When Jasmine lost her job, she and her daughter had no place to go. They ended up living in a friend's car. When she got connected to CHAT, her life began to change. CHAT provided temporary housing for the mother and daughter, supportive services to the family, and helped them find an apartment to move into on their own.

Jasmine says, "Before CHAT, I ended up with a lot of dead ends on looking for housing, food, resources. With the HUSH program you have your worker [Sharice], you have access to resources. Having that extra support, whether it be weekly meetings with Sharice or check-in calls, is very helpful for someone like me."

In addition to Sharice's support, Jasmine said CHAT's food program made a big difference. (Residents receive boxes of food every two

weeks.) "I appreciated the food donations – things like fruits and vegetables, eggs, salads, it all adds up. It really helped."

After less than a year with CHAT, Jasmine and her daughter are now in permanent housing. Asked how she feels about that development, Jasmine says, "We are more comfortable now. And we are happy!"

PLANNED GIVNG – A LEGACY TO CONTINUE CHAT'S WORK

To help ensure that unhoused individuals and families will continue to be helped in the future, CHAT now has a Planned Giving program.

What is Planned Giving? It's a donation that is set up now to be donated at a future date. Planned giving donations are usually arranged for distribution after a donor has passed away. They also are referred to as legacy giving.

While legacy gifts are often made as a bequest in a donor's will, they can take other forms as well. This includes gifts of life insurance, charitable annuities, charitable remainder trusts, real estate, retirement accounts, and gifts of stocks or securities.

There are many reasons why donors use planned giving to support their favorite non-profit organizations. It gives them a way to leave a large gift that they would not be able to make during their lifetimes. As donors plan their estates, bequests give them an opportunity to leave a lasting legacy. It's also something donors can do that won't affect their current available income. Many donors would like to give more but may not have the disposable income to do so.

The donor, not CHAT, decides what form a planned gift will take, with assistance from their financial advisor. However, Sarah Graham, CHAT's Financial and Development Director, will be happy to answer basic questions and point donors in the right direction to get started.
